Case studies differ: location based v. sector based

Involve links to rural areas, where migrants come from

Analyse the intersection between work and residence

Collaborate across cities/teams

Seasonal migration

- Gender differences in migration patterns (but also language, cast, class)
- What would be an exclusive city, what is our perspective on inclusivity? Who of us has an informal perspective, or a top-end perspective?
- Are smart cities based on smart phones (and therefore exclusive to those, who do not have smart phones)?
- What is our role as academics/researchers?
- Architecture is a clear form of practice, we have to question this practice, since architecture currently caters only for a small segment of society.
- Curriculum structure reflects an 'idealised' practice of architecture; we have to analyse case studies and curricula
- Students (and many teachers) are often romanticising the design process, they have not/little interest in social aspects
- In India, everything apart from roads (especially housing) is provided privately, which is a mechanism of exclusion
- Who takes social knowledge to the architecture classroom?
- Inclusiveness Is a comparatively recent discourse, it should be investigated, how it emerged, who is involved in defining inclusiveness
- Informality is fashionable; do identify different approaches to informality should be a task of the BINUCOM project
- How can we support community initiatives? Which incentives can we give to students to participate in community initiatives? [e.g. assignments and credits?]

Avoid the equation of informality and inclusivity
