### **SYLLABUS**

## Description

The course embraces five broad Topics as listed below:

- 1. Housing Theories and Policies (Lecture and Seminar)
- 2. Formal Housing: Public Housing and Real estate (2 Lectures)
- 3. Informal Housing (Lecture and Seminar)
- 4. Sustainable Housing (2 Lectures)
- 5. Participatory Planning and design (2 Lectures, Seminar and Project)

## Course objectives & structure

The course intends to equip students to critically evaluate and examine urban housing Theories, policies and regulations. It also helps the student to build their problem solving capacities in the fields of housing and community development. Students should be able to understand the existing housing challenges both locally and globally and bring about proposals which are practically and strategically innovative; economically feasible, socially acceptable and environmentally sound strategies.

**Learning Outcomes** After completion of this course:

• Students will be familiar with existing housing theories/ concepts, policies, and planning

practices

• Students will be able to analyze (evaluate and examine) the effects of urban housing policies and

regulations in urban housing

• Students will have the skills to formulate strategies/ innovative planning ideas to existing

housing problems

**Course Structure** 

The course is structured in such a way that students take the center stage of the learning process. Its

delivery is interactive type. Students are expected to contribute on each topic. Participation and active

involvement is rewarded. The course consists of lectures, readings, writing assignments, class exercises,

planning Project, presentations and final examination. Moreover, relevant documentary/commercial

videos will be used as supplementary to the lectures. Required readings and assignments will be

announced in class. Discussions are an integral part of the course.

**Prerequisites** 

This course requires a student to be a BSc graduate or a student in Urban Planning or related Program

and has previously completed a basic course in housing (Housing I).

**Assignments** 

Students are expected to work on and present reviews of two scientific articles on particular topics and

engage in a major group semester project.
