SOCIAL POLICY ANALYSIS in the context of informal housing

Course Description

This course focuses on providing the basic understanding of social policy analysis in the context of informal housing. The course provides an understanding of the social, economic, political, and global factors that influence the development and implementation of social policies. It combines the effects of values (such as social justice), principles and ideologies in the definition of social problems and in the development/formulation of public policies in general and social policies on informal housing in particular. It includes the role of government, nongovernmental, and for-profit organizations in policy-making and implementation, the influence of policies and programs in reducing poverty and enhancing health and economic well-being, and the importance of research in policy analysis, and the ways in which policy efforts can be improved.

The course provides a systematic framework for analyzing social policies within the context of historical, contemporary, and global factors in Ethiopia. Critical thinking skills and effective communication of the results of social policy analysis with regards to informal housing are emphasized. The course exposes students to the social, political and economic issues on the agendas of developing nations: poverty, hunger, child abuse, health care, the rights of populations-at-risk (stigmatized groups, mentally ill, disabled), and the needs of migrant and refugee populations. Emphasis is given to human rights issues. Students also will be exposed to the Ethiopian current social policies, and will get the chance to investigate and understand the background and the contents of each policy. Lectures, group discussion and presentations, assignments and policy analysis project, and exams will be the main methods of delivery and assessment for this course.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course students will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the basic terms and concepts used to talk about social problems and social policies, especially with regards to informal settlements
- Describe knowledge of the basic methods used to study social problems and social policies
- Explain how values, preferences, ideology, and other factors influence social problem definitions, social policies created to respond to those problems, and the service delivery approaches implemented as a result of those social policies
- Identify the knowledge of various Ethiopian social policies and poverty reduction programs in housing
- Demonstrate critical thinking skills in relation to social problems, social policies, and social services

Student Workload

According to University of Gondar (UoG) Curriculum for Masters in Social Work (MSW), the course social policy analysis is a three credit hours (3 Cr.Hr) course, which is equivalent to five ECTS (5 ECTS), and given at first year second semester.
